Making a Clock

Supplies:

- 1/2" MDF to cut out round
- Clock hands and a High Torque Movement (clockparts.com or TimeSavers)
- Acrylic Paint: Base Color and Finishing color (I use dark brown and white-the antiquing gives the finished look)
- Crackle Medium-if crackle finish is desired (found at any home improvement or craft store)
- Antiquing Stain-or watered down burnt umber
- Template for aligning numbers at the correct angle (click link on Clock Post)

For Vinly Lettering

• Vinyl lettering 1-12 & Any personalization (aprox 4" high for 4' clock, 3" for 3' clock, and 2" for 2' clock)

For Painted on Lettering

- Black painters pen (Don't use a sharpie, they fade over time)
- Carbon Paper to transfer numbers or any desired words or decorations in the middle
- Sandpaper for distressing
- Numbers printed out for copying onto clock (aprox 4" high for 4' clock, 3" for 3' clock, and 2" for 2' clock)
- Clear spray paint to seal your clock.

Tools you will need:

- Drill
- Router (If movement shaft is too short you may need to route out the back where the movement will fit in.
- Paint brushes
- Rags for antiquing

Instructions

- 1. Cut out your round to your desired size. (for a more finished look you can route the edges of the round)
- 2. Find center of your round and drill hole
- 3. Trace movement on back of round to know where to route (make sure the depth is appropriate for your movement)
- 4. Paint with a base coat (10-15 min to dry)
- 5. Coat with crackle paint (45min- 1 hour to dry)-be sure to read the crackle medium manufactures instructions for proper application. (if desired)
- 6. Apply top coat (30-45 min to dry)
- 7. Align numbers using the template taped to the middle of the clock (a yard stick or other straight object can help you find the hour marks. This would be a good time to make your minute marks if desired
 - *tip-for the minute markers cut a stencil out of some heave cardstock then you can stencil the same mark 60 times.
- 8. Apply vinyl lettering or Trace on numbers with carbon paper
- 9. Paint in numbers with paint pen or fine paint brush
- 10. Copy & paint any desired decoration to center using carbon paper
- 11. Lightly distress numbers with a fine sandpaper to age (be sure paint is completely dry!)
- 12. Antique with gel stain or watered down paint
- 13. Spray a clear top coat on to protect.
- 14. Finish by putting on clock parts
- * The clock works come with a hanger. But for a larger clock I would recommend some hinged picture hangers that can hold a heavy load. **Congratulations you have made your first clock!
