Making Your Tulip Yard Stake

Supplies:

1" X 8" X 3' pine

1- 3 1/2' stake or 1" X 2"

6- 1 1/4" wood screws

Hunter Green Paint

Red Paint

Clear top coat spray paint

Wood Glue

Directions:

Copy pattern on to cardstock or heavy-duty paper. Cut out pattern. (Cut just inside the black line)
Trace pattern onto pine.

Cut out pieces with a scroll saw. Cut the end of the stake at a 45-degree angle. Sand edges. The more you sand the edges the chunkier the flower will look. (That gives more of a primitive feel.) After all of your sanding is done clean off all of the sawdust. (You can use a damp cloth or cheesecloth.)

Paint all the pieces. You can use craft paint, but we just used spay paint when we made them. Let dry completely.

Distress edges. Antique if desired. Coat with topcoat spray paint. Let dry completely.

Assemble flower gluing on top petal with wood glue and secure with two wood screws on back. (Pre-drill to prevent splitting, be sure to not go all the way through)

Line up stake where you want it secured onto the flower mark where your screws will go and Pre- drill holes on stake. This will prevent splitting. Screw stake onto flower with 2 screws.

Repeat the step for the leaves.
